MAYOR BING MEETS VOLUNTEERS AT WORLD MEDICAL RELIEF



On November 9, 2011 **Detroit Mayor Dave Bing** took time out of his busy schedule to come to World Medical Relief and meet the volunteers who are instrumental in delivering its humanitarian services locally and internationally.

Arriving at 9 a.m. he walked into the hustle and bustle of the first day of the 2011 **blanket distribution**. Members of the blanket committee and students of the Detroit Job Corps were busy bringing thousands of blankets down from the seventh floor to the loading dock. Here they loaded the waiting trucks and vans from the Detroit area homeless shelters. The Mayor took time to meet with all.

The Mayor then visited the pharmacy on the second floor. He was very impressed with the **Affordable Prescription Program** which is the longest running program of its kind. He also praised World Medical Relief for the efficiency of its operations.

At the third floor the Mayor took great interest in learning about the sorting process of the medical supplies and had the chance to meet with many of the volunteers working here.



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RICHARD L. JUSTICE AWARD



At a special award ceremony World Medical Relief representatives Carolyn Racklyeft, Director of Local Programs and Josephine Jabara, Director of Development received the trophy for the Richard L. Justice award. This \$10,000 grant, administered by Metro Health Foundation, is to support the development of a donor database system and planned giving materials.



Thanks to hundreds of contributors and volunteers Christmas will be a little warmer for the thousands of people who are displaced and in shelters or other temporarily housing.

The Blanket Relief for Area Shelters has distributed **12,750** twin size blankets and **2,607** crib blankets to **64** homeless shelters and other agencies. **Thank you so much!!!!**

Especially the strong arms and legs of the students from Detroit Job Corps made the distribution much easier for the blanket committee to coordinate!

BREAKING RECORDS

104 YEARS YOUNG

World Medical Relief serves thousands of Michiganders every year including perhaps one of Michigan's oldest resident.

Mrs. A. is a client of the supply program and is 104 years young! Her niece, who picks up the supplies, tells us that "her aunt is still quite spry!"

1800 AND COUNTING

Since its start in 1953, much of the work at World Medical Relief is done by volunteers. At the end of October this year we calculated that over 1800 people lend a hand to fulfill World Medical Relief's mission to relieve human suffering. In comparison: At the end of December 2010 we recorded a total number of 1770 volunteers.

GAYLORDS GALORE

Many records are broken this year but the last week in November saw some amazing work of the volunteer packers on the third floor.

Sixty six gaylords (4'x4'x4' cardboard shipping crates) were packed with medical supplies in one week. Julia Martin, the assistant of George Samson, CEO, also broke her personal record by typing the packing lists for this record number of gaylords. It surely helped that her formal training was in court reporting.

In 2011, 2000 gaylords were packed. An increase from the 1,800 in 2010.



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PEACE THROUGH HEALTH CARE

Pikit is a Filipino word which literally means "closed eyes". It is also the name of a town in the Mindanao region, in the troubled Southern Philippines.

The ongoing struggle between government forces and other armed groups makes this town a dangerous place. Its residents disappear into their homes before the sun goes down, adding a sad ring to the name Pikit because the people close their eyes early to go to sleep to avoid the dangers outside the home.

Yet, amidst this turmoil there is a place where both sides of the armed conflict can come and find medical help in time of need. It is the local hospital equipped by World Medical Relief. Run by a courageous doctor who opted to stay, despite the danger, and to practice medicine, his confidence bolstered by the support of World Medical Relief. The peaceful clinic creates a zone of harmony showing the city's residents that it is possible to co-exist without strife.

The armed conflict in Mindanao has raged since the 70s and has claimed around 120,000 lives with an estimated 2-3 billion dollars in economic losses, deepening the sense of hopelessness and lack of peace in the hearts of people who were already downtrodden by poverty. Pockets of hope and peace do exist in the many other clinics which also received shipments with medical equipment and supplies from World Medical Relief. In the long and troubled history of Philippine local governance, local leaders usually use their position, power and influence to secure benefits in their personal favor. Seeing the positive effects of accessible health care, top officials are now putting their self interests aside and are requesting assistance from World Medical Relief

My wish is that in the future history books will tell that once upon a time, the elusive peace in Mindanao was acquired through the hard-working doctors, supported by their dedicated government officials in hospitals properly equipped by the generosity of a Detroit based charity named World Medical Relief. The history books will say: World Medical Relief gave us hope, peace and enduring belief that there are still many wonderful people in this world!

Having said all this.....I thank you for honoring me with the Global Humanitarian Award. It is encouraging to be recognized by you. I would also like to thank you for your continued support providing health care and hope for a better future!

Sister Beth went on to run many full 26.2 mile marathons and while on assignment in Rome she even ran races where the runners were blessed by the Pope on the starting line.

Last October, a few weeks before her 83rd birthday she ran a half Detroit Free Press Marathon. "It was wonderful to hear people cheering me on. It was probably not because of my speed but my white hair", remarked Sister Beth, with a twinkle in her eyes. In any case we congratulate her with this amazing accomplishment!
