VOLUNTEERS HONORED AT BREAKFAST







Baydoun speaking to Liberian children





On a November 1953 evening, a Detroit home-makers, Irene Auberlin and her husband, Les, flicked on the television and saw a military chaplain asking for help for a Korean orphanage that had been set up by GIs at Inchon. Irene cried out to her husband impulsively, "Oh Les, we must do something to help." Later, she would exclaim, "It was God's way of saying, "Pull yourself together. Get busy. Help other people who are in worse shape than you are." It was on that night that World Medical Relief was born.

The next morning Mrs. Auberlin went to neighbors, begged three barrels of diapers and children's clothing and shipped them off to Korea. Later, learning that the orphanage was struggling to establish a clinic, she designed, with the help of a physi-



cian friend, a list of what was needed to equip such a clinic. Then, she borrowed a trailer, hitched it to her car and set out on a scrounging mission, telling doctors and hospitals officials about the Korean orphanage and that they needed to help.

Since these humble beginnings, at least 120 countries have received over 1 billion dollars in humanitarian aid while locally 1.3 million prescriptions have been dispensed to poor uninsured people in Michigan

SISTERS IN FAITH


"I knew immediately that God had put us together for a purpose", said Cecile Jean about Sister Monica whom she met at a daily mass in Ann Arbor. Sister Monica had come from Ghana to stay with her cousin for some R+R. Unfortunately, her cousin left for Africa leaving her here alone.

Mrs. Jean sprang into action and found Sister Monica a place to stay with other nuns at the Felician Mother house in Livonia. The two stayed in touch because "Sister Monica has such a contagious smile and spirit", Mrs. Jean says. "You cannot help but to feel drawn to her".

She learned that the Sr. Monica's order travels to the outback in Ghana to take care of leprosy sufferers, AIDS patients and the elderly in rural communities without water or electricity. The nuns also work with a doctor in a hospital.

Cecile remembered that she called on World Medical Relief 20 years ago for a shipment to Belarus and asked Sr. Monica whether they could use medical supplies and equipment. Since Sister's stay was almost over, the two got in the car and rushed to World Medical Relief. The application information was faxed to the doctor and the shipping process was set in motion.

More miracles happened to Sister Monica when she was in Michigan. Back in Ghana the order had started to build a school but ran out of funding. While she was here she received the funding to complete the school. More good news came: Madonna University will accept



two nuns from Ghana in its nursing program. They will go back to Ghana and train others.

Cecile Jean's big wish was to build a well in Africa. A well was not possible though, but a cistern to collect rainwater was. Hopefully, in time for the next rainy season, Mrs. Jean will have her dream fulfilled. She wishes that the Ghanese will thank God for every cup of water.

Last February a delighted Sister Monica received the shipment. News also came that land for a clinic was donated.

Cecile Jean, who was a housewife all her life and never ventured too far from home says: "I am so humbled that God has picked little me. It is amazing how our Lord has brought people together".


